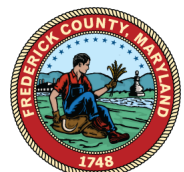

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## **Page 2 / New Date Announced**

This study was a collaboration between the Black Maternal Health Community Advisory Board and Black Mamas Building Bridges and has been focused for the last year on identifying the root causes of negative birthing experiences. The project has used community based participatory research to amplify the voices of Black women to share their birthing experiences and challenges. Their lived experiences provide the basis for the identification of root causes and barriers to optimal outcomes. The project will continue in its next phase and focus on identifying strategies to address ways to improve Black maternal birth outcomes.
